

**GRENADIER VILLAGE TOWNHOME CONDOMINIUM ASSOCIATION  
PET POLICY  
REVISED JUNE, 2000**

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Please review the following updated pet policy as a reminder of the Pet Policy pertaining to all Townhome Residents.

**MANDATORY RULE**

It is not acceptable to walk your animals on the Grenadier Village apartment property. Apartment residents are not allowed pets; therefore, it is not permitted for pets from the Townhomes to be in areas other than the Condominium.


We have opened up a pathway area in the woods at the west end of Grenadier Village in order that animals may be walked there on a regular basis. The following regulations apply to all pet owners.

1. Attached for your review please find "Notice to Homeowners", an amendment to the By-Laws as adopted by the Board of Managers at a meeting held on January 7, 1986. This notice clearly outlines the Grenadier Village Condominium Pet Policy, which was adopted in conformance with the Town of Salina dog ordinance. Said ordinance is also enclosed.
2. HOMEOWNERS MUST NOT CHAIN OR TIE THEIR DOGS ANYWHERE OUTSIDE OF THEIR TOWNHOMES. This includes front railings, back decks, common area trees, etc. THIS IS A CLEAR CUT VIOLATION OF PET POLICY WITHIN THE CONDOMINIUM.
3. Homeowners must NEVER leave their pets outside unattended.
4. When your dog is out for a late evening walk (11:00 P.M. or later), do not leave your pet unattended. Your dog must not be allowed to bark and disturb or awaken neighbors.
5. PLEASE - walk your pet at the western wooded area. Be considerate of your neighbors, and do not allow your pet to relieve himself on lawn areas having close proximity to other townhome entrances, garage door areas, etc.

**REMEMBER: YOU are responsible for cleaning up after your pet.**

**Local Law Filing - Town of Salina**

**Local Law No. 6 of the year 2010.**

**A local law amending Chapter 70, Animals, of the Town Code of the Town of Salina to provide for licensing of dogs by the Town of Salina.**

**Be it enacted by the Town Board of the Town of Salina as follows:**

Chapter 70 of the Town Code of the Town of Salina is amended as follows:

SECTION I: Article I, **Dogs**, of Chapter 70, Animals, of the Town Code of Salina, shall be replaced entirely with the following:

**§ 70-1. Purpose.**

The purpose of this article is to provide for the licensing, identification and control of dogs within the Town of Salina.

**§ 70-2. Exemptions.**

- A. Any dog harbored within the Town of Salina which is owned by a resident of the Town of Salina or licensed by the Town of Salina, or which is owned by a non-resident of New York State and licensed by a jurisdiction outside the State of New York, shall for a period of thirty (30) days be exempt from this article.
- B. This article shall not apply to any dog confined to the premises of any public or private hospital devoted solely to the treatment of sick animals, or confined for the purposes of research to the premises of any college or other educational or research institution.
- C. This article shall not apply to any dog confined to the premises of any person, firm or corporation engaged in the business of breeding or raising dogs for profit and licensed as a Class A dealer under the Federal Laboratory Animal Welfare Act.

**§ 70-3. Definitions.**

As used in this article, the following words shall have the following respective meanings:

A & M LAW - Agriculture and Markets Law of the State of New York.

CLERK - The Town Clerk, or Deputy Town Clerk, of the Town of Salina or his or her agent.

DANGEROUS DOG - As defined in A & M Law §108 therein made and provided or hereinafter amended.

DOG - Any member of the species canis familiaris.

ANIMAL/DOG CONTROL OFFICER - Any individual appointed by the Town Board to enforce this Article, who shall have all of the powers of a constable or other peace officer in the execution of the provisions of this Article or Article 7 of the Agricultural and Markets Law of New York. These powers shall include the service of any process, including an appearance ticket, related to any proceeding brought under the provisions of This Article or Article 7 of the Agricultural and Markets Law.

GUIDE, HEARING OR SERVICE DOG, or any other special use dog - As defined in the A & M Law.

HARBOR - To provide food or shelter to any dog.

IDENTIFICATION TAG - a tag issued by the licensing municipality which sets forth an identification number, together with the name of the Town, the State of New York, contact information, including telephone number for the town and such other information as the Town deems appropriate.

IDENTIFIED DOG - Any dog carrying an identification tag as provided in this article.

OWNER - Any person who harbors or keeps any dog.

OWNER OF RECORD - The person in whose name any dog was last licensed pursuant to this article or the State of New York (if prior to January 1, 2011), except that if any license is issued on application of a person under eighteen (18) years of age, the owner of record shall be deemed to be the parent or guardian of such person. If it cannot be determined in whose name any dog was last licensed or if the owner of record has filed a statement pursuant to the provisions of Section 70.8 of this article, the owner shall be deemed to be the owner of record of such dog, except that if the owner is under eighteen years of age, the owner of record shall be deemed to be the parent or guardian of such person.

PERSON - Any individual, corporation, partnership, association or other organized group of persons, municipality or other legal entity.

TOWN - The area within the corporate limits of the Town of Salina.

#### **§ 70-4. Licensing Requirements.**

- A. All dogs harbored within the Town that are four (4) months of age or older, unless otherwise exempted, must be licensed. No license shall be required for any dog that is under the age of four months and which is not at large or that is residing in a pound or shelter maintained by or under contract or agreement with the state or any county, city, town or village, or duly incorporated society for the prevention of cruelty to animals,

duly incorporated humane society or duly incorporated dog protective association. Licenses shall only be issued or validated by the Clerk of the Town.

- B. Application for dog license shall be made to the Clerk and shall be accompanied by the appropriate license fee, as provided for hereinafter
- C. The application shall state the sex, actual or approximate year of birth, breed, color and municipal identification number of the dog, and other identification marks, if any, and the name, address, telephone number, county and town of residence of owner, and such other information as deemed necessary by the Clerk.
- D. Each license application shall be accompanied by proof that the dog has been vaccinated against rabies or a statement from a licensed veterinarian that such vaccination would endanger the dog's life, in which case vaccination shall not be required.
- E. In the case of a spayed or neutered dog, every application shall be accompanied by a certificate signed by a licensed veterinarian showing that the dog has been spayed or neutered, provided that such certificate shall not be required if the same is already on file with the Clerk.
- F. Upon validation by the clerk, the application as described herein shall be issued. Once an application has been validated, no refund therefor shall be made. The Clerk shall provide a copy of the license to the owner and retain a copy in the Town records. Upon request, the license shall be made available by the town to the commissioner of the New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets for purposes of rabies or other animal disease control efforts and actions.
- G. Each license issued or renewed shall be valid for a period of one year and shall not be transferable. Each license shall expire on the last day of the last month of the period for which they are raised. Upon the transfer of ownership of any dog, the new owner shall immediately make application for a license for such dog.

#### **§ 70-5. Purebred Licenses.**

The Town shall not issue purebred or kennel licenses.

#### **§ 70-6. License Fees and Surcharges.**

- A. The fee for a dog license issued pursuant to Section 70-4 shall be established by Town Board resolution from time to time hereafter. Where the owner submits a statement certified by a licensed veterinarian stating that he or she has examined the dog and found that because of old age or other reason, the life of the dog would be endangered by spaying or neutering, the license fee for the dog shall be the same as for a spayed

or neutered dog.

- B. In addition to the license fee established in subdivision (A) of this section, each applicant for a dog license shall pay such surcharges as set forth in the Resolution of the Town Board. Where the owner submits a statement certified by a licensed veterinarian stating that he or she has examined the dog and found that because of old age or other reason, the life of the dog would be endangered by spaying or neutering, such dog shall be treated as a spayed or neutered dog for purposes of determining any surcharges.
- C. In addition to the license fee established in subdivision (A) of this section, and the surcharges described in subdivision (B) of this section, it is within the Town Board's discretion to assess against each applicant for a dog license an additional surcharge, as set forth by Town Board resolution. The amounts collected through this additional surcharge shall be retained by the Town to defray the cost of an enumeration of dogs living within the Town and the cost of providing replacement identification tags. The Town may also assess an additional fee against any person applying for a dog for a dog identified as unlicensed during an enumeration conducted by the Town.
- D. There shall be no fee for any license issued for any guide dog, hearing dog, service dog, war dog, working search dog, detection dog, police work dog or therapy dog, as those terms are defined in Section 108 of Article 7 of the New York State Agriculture and Markets Law. Each copy of any license issued for such dogs shall be conspicuously marked "Guide Dog", "Hearing Dog", "Service Dog", "Working Search Dog", "War Dog", "Detection Dog", "Police Work Dog" or "Therapy Dog" as may be appropriate by the Clerk.
- E. Any dog owner presenting sufficient proof that such dog owner is 65 years of age or over may be entitled to pay a lower annual license fee, as set forth by Town Board resolution.

**§ 70-7. Identification Tags.**

- A. Each dog license pursuant to section 70.4 of this article shall be assigned, at the time the dog is first licensed, a Town identification number. Such identification number shall be carried by the dog on an identification tag which shall be affixed to a collar on the dog at all times. At the time a dog is first licensed, one identification tag shall be furnished to the owner at no charge. Any replacement tag shall be obtained by the owner at his expense at a fee and in a manner prescribed by the Clerk.
- B. A dog participating in a dog show shall be exempt from the identification requirement in subdivision (A) of this section during the participation in such dog show.
- C. No tag carrying an identification number shall be affixed to the collar of any dog other

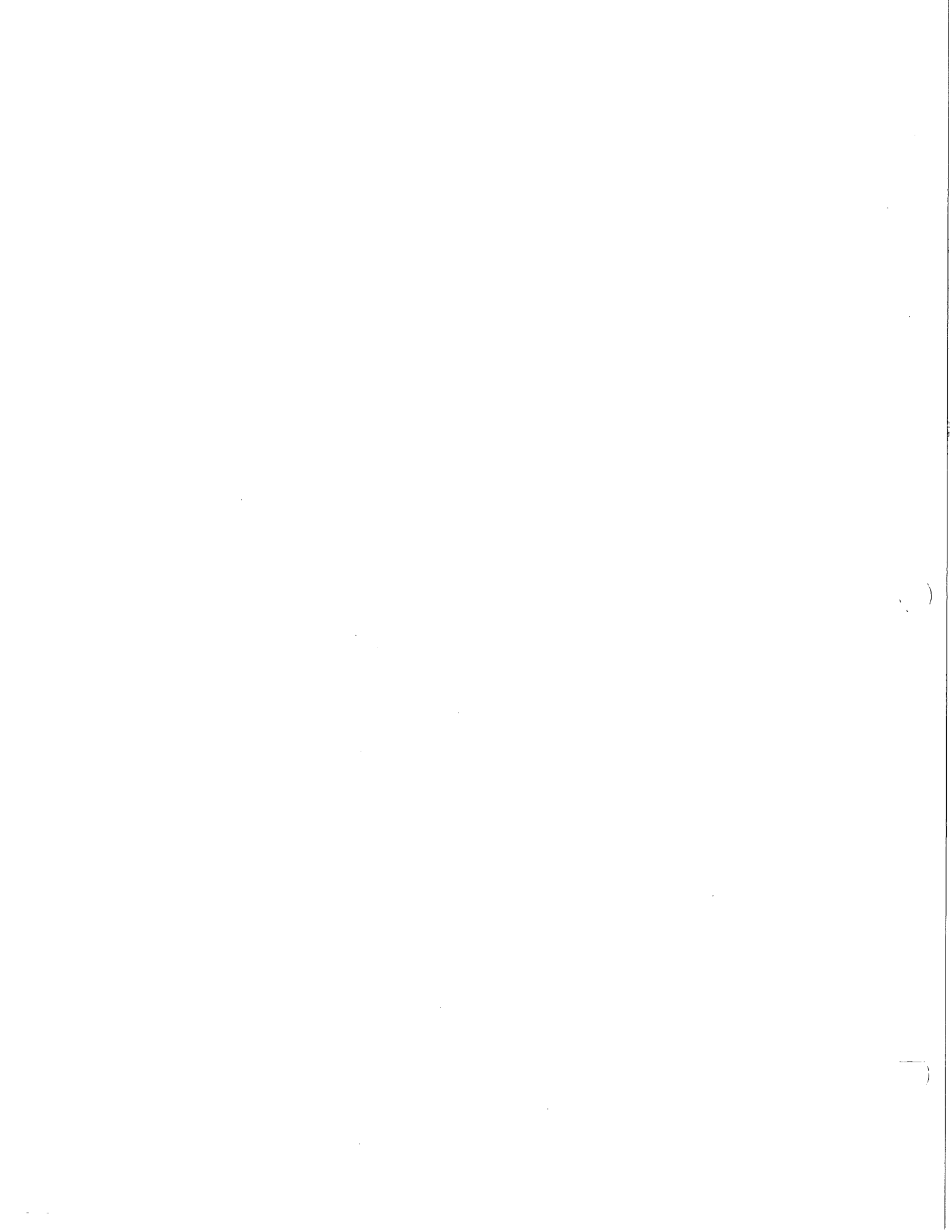
than the one to which that number has been assigned.

**§ 70-8. Change of Ownership; Lost or Stolen dog.**

- A. In the event of a change in the ownership of any dog which has been licensed pursuant to this article or in the address of the owner of record of any such dog, the owner of record shall, within ten (10) days of such change, file with the Clerk a written report of such change. Such owner of record shall be liable for any violation of this article until such filing is made or until the dog is licensed in the name of the new owner.
- B. If any dog which has been licensed pursuant to this article is lost or stolen, the owner of record shall, within ten (10) days of the discovery of such loss or theft, file with the clerk a written report of such loss or theft. In the case of a loss or theft, the owner of record of any such dog shall not be liable for any violation of this article committed after such report is filed.
- C. In the case of a dog's death, the owner of record shall notify the Clerk either prior to or upon the time for renewal of the license.

**§ 70.9. Violations**

- A. It shall be a violation, punishable as provided in subdivision (C) of this section, for:
  - (1) any owner to fail to license any dog;
  - (2) any owner to fail to have any dog identified as required by this article;
  - (3) any person to knowingly affix to any dog any false or improper identification tag, special identification tag for identifying guide, service or hearing dogs;
  - (4) any owner or custodian of any dog to fail to confine, restrain or present such dog for any lawful purpose pursuant to this article;
  - (5) any person to furnish any false or misleading information on any form required to be filed with the Town pursuant to the provisions of this article or rules and regulations promulgated thereto;
  - (6) any owner of a dog to fail to notify the Town of any change of ownership or address as required by Section 70.8 of this article.
  - (7) An owner or custodian of any dog to fail to exercise due diligence in handling his or her dog, if the handling results in harm to another dog that is a guide, hearing or service dog.



- B. It shall be a violation of the owner of a dog for said owner's dog:
- (1) to be at large off the owner's premises, except when such dog is restrained by a leash not exceeding six feet in length;
  - (2) to engage in habitual loud barking, crying or whining as to conduct itself in such a manner as to unreasonably and habitually annoy any person.
  - (3) to cause damage or destruction to property or commit a nuisance by defecating or urinating upon the premises of a person other than the owner of such dog.
  - (4) while in heat, to be off the Owners's premises, whether or not said dog is at large or restrained by a leash.
- C. A violation, as above, of this article shall constitute an offense punishable by a fine not to exceed two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00).

**§ 70.10. Enforcement.**

A. Seizure of dog.

- (1) The Dog Control Officer or any other peace officer may seize any dog which:
  - (a) is not licensed as required by Section 70.4, whether or not such dog is on or off the owner's premises;
  - (b) is not identified and which is not on the owner's premises;
  - (c) is found in violation of Section 70.9;
  - (d) poses an immediate threat to the public safety.
- (2) Any dog seized pursuant to subsection "A (1)" of this subsection shall be taken to such place as may be designated by the Town Board as a place of detention, and there such dog shall be properly fed and cared for until the expiration of the applicable redemption period set forth in Section 118 of the Agriculture and Markets Law. In the event that such dog bears a license tag, the person seizing the dog shall, within three (3) days thereafter, ascertain the name of the owner thereof and give said owner immediate notice by serving on said owner, personally or by certified mail, return receipt requested, an instrument, in writing, stating that the dog has been seized, indicating when, where and why the dog was seized and stating that the dog will be sold or destroyed unless redeemed within 12 days of the date of the seizure of the dog. If an impounded dog is not redeemed within the applicable redemption period set forth in Section 118 of



the Agriculture and Markets Law, the owner shall forfeit title to such dog, and it may thereafter be sold or destroyed by the Town.

**B. Appearance Tickets.**

The Dog Control Officer or any peace officer observing a violation of this article (or by verified complaint filed by a citizen) is hereby authorized to issue and serve an appearance ticket for such violation, pursuant to the Criminal Procedure Law, to the owner of any dog violating any provisions of this article. The appearance ticket shall be in the form prescribed by said Criminal Procedure Law. Forms shall appear on all appearance tickets whereby a person charged with a violation may either admit the violation as charged on the appearance ticket or deny part or all of the violation on an appearance ticket issued pursuant to this subsection and may make an answer to such appearance ticket by certified or registered mail, return receipt requested, within seven (7) days of the violation in lieu of a personal appearance on the return date at the time and court specified in said appearance ticket.

**§ 70.11. Redemption.**

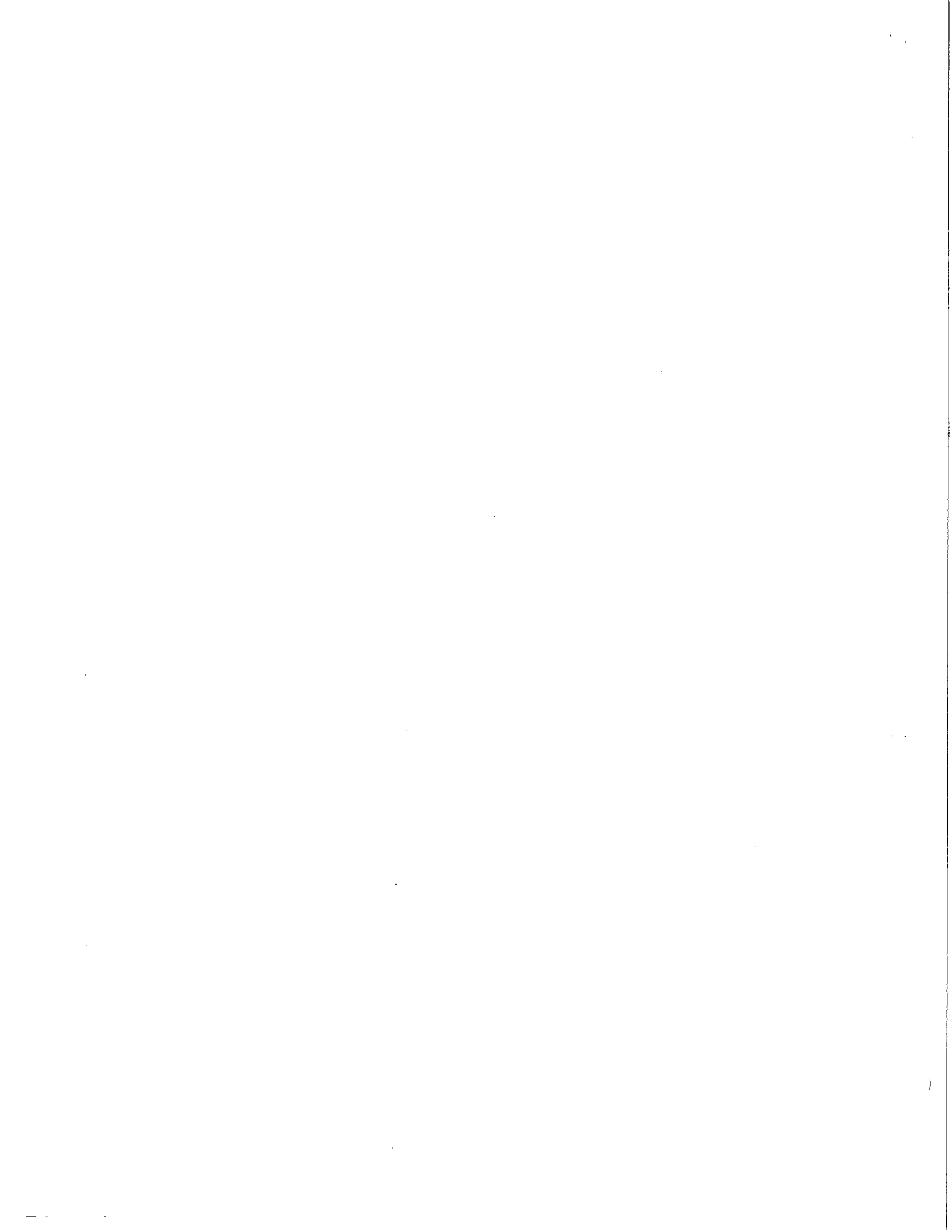
Each dog seized may be redeemed by its owner, provided that such owner produces proof that the dog has been licensed and identified pursuant to the provisions of this article; and further provided that the owner pays the applicable impoundment fees as set forth in the then-existing contract between the Town and any incorporated humane society or dog protective association providing pound or shelter services for the Town. These fees are in addition to the fines set forth in Section 70-9 (C).

**§ 70.12. Dangerous Dogs.**

The Town may proceed as to Dangerous Dogs in accordance with §118 of the A & M Law therein made and provided and as may be amended hereafter. The penalties, civil or otherwise, for a violation of said §118 of the A & M Law shall also be as set forth therein.

**§ 70.13. Effective Date.**

This article shall become effective on the 1<sup>st</sup> day of January, 2011.



Any dog seized by the Dog Control Officer will be subject to the following impoundment fees:

First pickup within a year	\$20.00
Second pickup within a year	\$30.00
Third pickup within a year	\$40.00

**PLUS**

The animal surrender fee of \$150.00, pursuant to a contract with the SPCA.

All seizure fees must be paid in cash.

**WHEN ARE THE RABIES VACCINATION CLINICS?**

Onondaga County Health Department, Division of Animal Disease Prevention sponsors rabies vaccination clinics throughout the year for a voluntary donation of \$10.00 per family. For more information regarding the clinic schedule please call the Town Clerk's Office or Onondaga County Health Department at 435-3165.

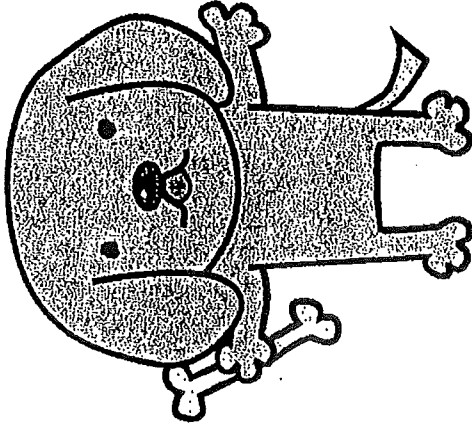


Please remember to contact the Town Clerk's Office if your dog is deceased, has been lost or stolen, or if you have transferred ownership to another person.

## WHEN MUST DOGS BE LICENSED?

Every dog owned or harbored in Town of Salina for longer than 30 days must be licensed when they reach four (4) months of age. However, if a dog under the age of four months is picked up by the Dog Control Officer for running loose, they must be licensed before the dog will be released to the owner.

## HOW DO YOU LICENSE YOUR DOG?

You may either apply for a dog license in person or by mail. Before a license can be issued the owner must present or mail to the Town Clerk's Office the following:

1. Proof of a rabies vaccination signed by a licensed veterinarian or a certificate stating why the life of the dog would be endangered by the vaccine.
2. If the dog is spayed or neutered a certificate from a licensed Veterinarian.
3. License fee per dog: **\$10.00** for spayed or neutered  
**\$18.00** un-spayed or un-neutered

**\*\*Note:** All dog owners that are **sixty five (65) years of age** or older are eligible for a senior discount.

After the application and appropriate certificates are submitted and the license fee has been paid, the license will be validated for one year. Each dog is assigned a permanent official identification ID number and issued a metal ID tag, which is to be attached to the dog's collar. All proof submitted will be returned to the dog owner. All license renewal forms will be mailed directly to the dog owner by the Town of Salina. If your dog is already licensed you have 30 days upon receipt of the renewal form to validate the dog license. If a renewal form is not received it is still the owner's responsibility to know when the dog license expires.

## WHAT ARE THE RULES PERTAINING TO DOGS?

The Town of Salina has one full-time dog control Officer on duty daily operating out of the Town Clerk's Office, and one part-time officer on duty after 4:30 p.m. For emergency situations only after 4:30 p.m. residents must contact the 911 Center.

In accordance with New York State Law, all dog bites must be reported to the police department and Animal Disease Control. The Dog Control Officer is responsible for implementing the Town Ordinance as it pertains to dogs. For new residents and as a reminder to established residents, who are dog owners, the following shall be unlawful in the Town of Salina:

1. To allow a dog to be at-large off the owner's premises except when such dog is restrained by a leash not exceeding six (6) feet in length.
2. To allow any dog in heat to be at-large off the owner's premises, whether or not such dog is at-large or restrained by a leash.
3. To allow a dog to engage in habitual loud barking, crying or whining, or to conduct itself in such manner as to unreasonably and habitually annoy any person.
4. To allow a dog to cause damage or destruction to property or commit a nuisance by defecating or urinating upon the premises of a person other than the owner of such dog.

## WHAT IF A DOG IS LOST OR STRAY?

The Dog Control Officer is also responsible for picking up lost and stray dogs. If your dog is lost or you find a lost dog, immediately contact the Town Clerk's Office. Dog owners should seek lost dogs at the SPCA by calling **454-4479**.

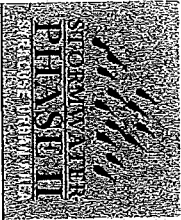
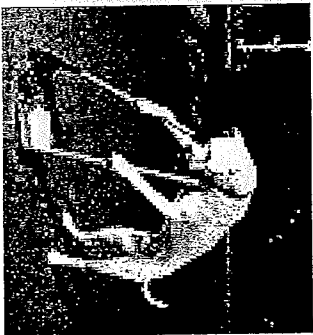

# **Scoop the Poop!**

**Dog owners can make a positive change in our community by keeping local water resources clean!**



This brochure was created as part of a public stormwater education program, jointly funded by the following municipalities: the Towns of Canastota, Clay, Dewitt, Geddes, LaFayette, Lyander, Manlius, Marcellus, Onondaga, Salina, Sullivan, Van Buren, Hastings, Chenango, West, Morris, and Pompey; the Villages of East Syracuse, Liverpool, Phoenix, Fayetteville, Manlius, Marcellus, Minoa, North Syracuse, Solway, and Central Square; and the City of Syracuse, and Madison and Onondaga Counties.

## **Why all the fuss? Because pet waste pollutes local water resources and can be a significant public health risk!**

When rain or snowmelt flows over land surfaces, it carries pet waste to storm drains and eventually flows into nearby lakes, streams, and wetlands. The polluted runoff contains harmful bacteria and nutrients such as phosphorus and nitrogen and can make lakes and streams unsafe for drinking and swimming. Microorganisms found in the dog waste can cause human diseases and health problems from roundworms, Giardia and Salmonella, viruses, and parasites. Nitrogen and phosphorus from the waste will also promote the growth of unwanted algae and rooted aquatic plants in lakes and streams.



## **Stepping in dog waste can be a nasty experience.**

Even worse is the knowledge that dog waste may be polluting our drinking water, local swimming areas, and favorite lake fishing spots. Listed below are a few tips on how dog owners can protect local water resources.

## **Dog owners are encouraged to clean up after their pets in order to protect our local community and its water resources.**

- Always bring a plastic bag with you when you walk your dog.
- Use the bag like a glove, pick up the pet waste, turn the bag inside out, and seal it.
- Place the bag in the trash, or flush the un-bagged waste down the toilet. Homeowners with large yards can also bury the dog waste in a hole at least 5 inches deep and away from vegetable gardens and waterways.

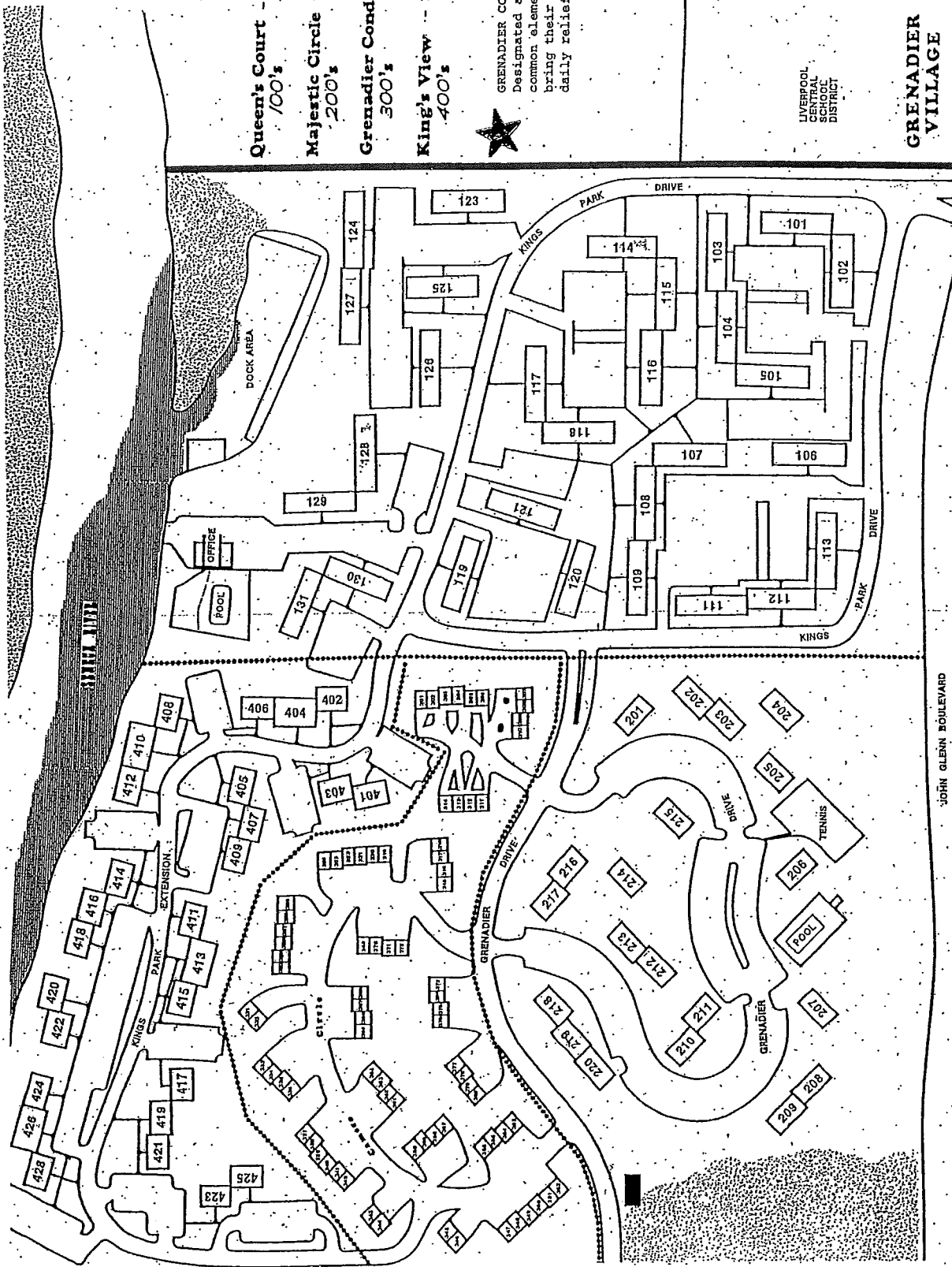
## **Never place the dog waste (bagged or un-bagged) in the storm drain!**

Storm drains lead directly to streams, rivers, lakes and wetlands. And remember — dog waste is only one of many pollutants that impact local waterways. Community members are also encouraged to reduce runoff containing lawn fertilizers, motor oil, driveway sand and salt, and yard waste such as grass clippings and leaves.



## **One day's waste from a large dog can contain 7.8 billion fecal Coliform bacteria.**

Pet waste pollutes our rivers, lakes, and streams. If you think picking up dog waste is unpleasant, try swimming in it!
